Enhancing the First Steps in Care: Co-Creating a “What to Expect” Video for Cancer Patients

Session Description:

Starting cancer care is an emotional and uncertain time, and patients and families often wonder what the first steps of their journey at BC Cancer will look and feel like. This session shares how BC Cancer partnered with Emily Carr University’s Health Design Lab and Patient & Family Partners to co-design a series of What to Expect videos intended to reduce anxiety, clarify expectations, and make the early stages of care more person-centred.

The session will begin with a brief reflection activity inviting participants to consider what patients and families may be experiencing when they first enter cancer care. Presenters will then provide an overview of the human centred, co design approach used to develop the videos, including early discovery work, process mapping, storytelling sessions with patient partners, design and storyboarding, all the while working with patient and family advisors to review materials and refine processes. Presenters will highlight how design decisions were shaped by lived experience and the principles of trauma-informed design, emotional safety, and person-centred care.

A dedicated segment, led by patient partners, will explore the meaningful role of lived experience in the project. Patient partners will speak about why these videos matter, how they reflect real patient and caregiver needs, and what the co-design process felt like from their perspective.

Participants will then view selected clips from the What to Expect video series and engage in facilitated small group discussions. Discussions will explore key themes surfaced in the videos, including navigating uncertainty, preparing for the first appointment, communication needs, and the supports that matter most early in the cancer journey. Through guided discussion and reflection, participants will consider how these insights can strengthen more compassionate and person-centred interactions at the beginning of care.

Patient partners will also respond to themes emerging from the discussions, offering additional perspective on how care teams can better support patients and families during these critical first steps. Attendees will leave with a deeper understanding of what matters most to patients at the beginning of their cancer journey, and with practical insights into how storytelling and co-designed educational tools can enhance care experiences across BC Cancer.

1. Describe how co-design methodologies, involving patients, caregivers, clinicians, and design partners shape the development of meaningful patient-centred educational tools
2. Recognize the role and impact of storytelling and lived experience in communicating complex cancer care information in ways that foster clarity, empathy, and emotional safety
3. Identify key elements of person-centred design processes, including engagement, storytelling and iterative feedback, and how they were applied in this project
4. Reflect on insights from the What to Expect videos and identify opportunities to strengthen person centred communication and support for patients and families at the beginning of care

From Participation to Partnership: Building Engagement Capable Environments in Cancer Care

Across healthcare systems, there is growing recognition that patient and family partnership improves quality, safety, experience, and service design. Yet many teams struggle to move beyond inviting patient partners to meetings toward creating environments where engagement is meaningful, supported, and able to influence decisions.

This interactive workshop will explore how to build engagement-capable environments within cancer programs, committees, and improvement initiatives. Drawing on BC Cancer's experience of embedding patient and family partnerships across provincial programs, participants will learn practical strategies for creating the conditions that set the stage for meaningful engagement.

The session will introduce key principles of patient and family partnership and explore organizational factors that support engagement capable environments including leadership commitment, clarity of purpose, inclusive meeting design, regular check-ins, and structures that support patient and family partners to contribute fully. Participants will be introduced to practical tools developed at BC Cancer to support engagement in action, including approaches to designing engagement-capable meetings and agendas, planning engagement activities, and incorporating feedback loops to ensure that patient and family perspectives meaningfully inform decisions.

Through facilitated discussion, small group exercises, and real-world examples, participants will reflect on their own programs and identify opportunities to strengthen engagement practices within their teams and initiatives. Participants will leave with practical ideas and tools they can apply immediately to strengthen patient and family partnership in their own work.
